NOTES ABOUT THE MUSIC

Here's a set of some of the best tunes Tin Pan Alley has to offer, with a couple of bossa novas thrown in for spice. Except for the latter, all the tunes are 32 bars long in either AABA or ABAC form, and the chord changes shouldn't pose any major problems. If you're comfortable with the blues and the "I Got Rhythm" changes, this is a good set to move up to. Or a more advanced player can use these tunes to relax and have fun after dealing with more challenging material.

Most of these tunes come from shows or movies from the 30's or 40's and were written by leading professional songwriters of the period. The revues and musicals that spawned these tunes are forgotten today, but jazz musicians have kept the tunes alive through repeated performances and recordings over the years.

Memories of the composers and lyricists of the golden era of Tin Pan Alley are fading into the past. Much has been written about Rodgers and Hart (This Can't Be Love) and the Gershwins (Who Cares?), but what of the others? Can't We Be Friends was written by Kay Swift and James Warburg (a.k.a. Paul James), a husbandwife team. Swift had close professional and personal ties with George Gershwin; fortunately Warburg was not the jealous type. My Ship has a lyric by Ira Gershwin, who collaborated with various composers before and after his brother George's death. The composer is Kurt Weill, also known for Mack The Knife and Speak Low. I Can't Give You Anything But Love was the first big hit for Jimmy McHugh (music) and Dorothy Fields (lyrics), who went on to write countless hits together and separately over three decades (I'm In The Mood For Love, On The Sunny Side Of The Street, etc.). This tune works well at several tempos, two of which are supplied here; singers will probably prefer the slower one. Darn That Dream was composed by Jimmy van Heusen, whose swinging bachelor lifestyle is said to have been Frank Sinatra's role model. He wrote an impressive number of memorable tunes with several lyricists, many for Bing Crosby movies, that jazz musicians have found attractive. Speaking of Sinatra, his championing of Jule Styne's songs (with lyricist Sammy Cahn) firmly established that composer in the pantheon of songwriting greats. In the mid-forties Sinatra introduced several Cahn-Styne songs (I Fall In Love Too Easily, Time After Time, etc.), including The Things We Did Last Summer. For Heaven's Sake has been a favorite of musicians since Fran Warren introduced it in 1946. Idaho was penned by Jesse Stone, whose songwriting career goes back to the '20s. Surprisingly, Stone's biggest successes began when as a staff arranger for Atlantic Records he composed some of the biggest early rock and roll hits, many under the pseudonym of Charles Calhoun (Money Honey, Shake, Rattle and Roll etc.). Who Can I Turn To (When Nobody Needs Me) was written by the British composers Anthony Newley and Leslie Bricusse in 1964, though it is stylistically compatible with tunes written two decades earlier.

The bossa novas provide an interesting contrast to the rest of this album's material. *No More Blues*, under its original title Chega de Saudade, launched the bossa nova and composer Antonio Carlos Jobim in Brazil in 1958. It was initially panned by the Brazilian critics for its adventurous (for popular music) harmonies and its unusual length of 68 bars. By the time it got its English title in 1962 via new lyrics by Jon Hendricks and Jesse Cavanaugh, though, it was recorded by many artists as the bossa nova's popularity reached America. Luiz Bonfa, another bossa pioneer, composed the title song for a forgotten 1967 movie, *The Gentle Rain*. The published sources for the song do not agree on the length of the vamp at the end of each chorus, so when you play it with your group make sure everyone's in agreement.

A word about the rhythm section: Mark Levine is equally adept at straight ahead and Latin jazz styles. In the last few years Lynn Seaton has earned the respect of his fellow bassists from Milt Hinton on down. And Steve Davis has proven that there are many ways to use the drums to accompany sensitively, from swinging to abstract jazz. All three have played and recorded with many jazz greats. This rhythm section makes it easy for you to sound good. Enjoy!
